"I've loved Cynthia Dale ever since," said the outgoing young stage star. "I've seen Guys and Dolls at Stratford four times already this season.

'I love singing, dancing and musical theatre, and I know I want to be an actress when I get older."

And she's spent the last few years working toward that dream.

Laura has been a member of the Waterloo Philharmonic Children's Choir for the past five years, and she's preparing to start her second year as a company

member at Carousel Dance. She's also spent the past two summers with the Junior Acting Studio at Wilfrid Laurier University, gaining some practical stage experience.
